






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Publisher's Word **Rest in Peace, Jacob**

Biography of the

Late Rt Hon. Dr. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah

t Hon. Dr. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah was born on March 23, 1965 in Lalogi, Gulu District to Mzee Nathan Okori and Imat Karen Atwon Okori. Jacob attended St. Joseph's College Layibi and Dr. Obote College Boroboro for his O-Level education where he took on leadership roles and honed his debating and oratory skills. He completed his A-Level education at Kololo Senior Secondary School in Kampala in 1987. Thereafter he joined Makerere University in 1988

where he studied Agricultural Economics, and graduated in 1991 with honors. That same year, he enrolled in the school of law, also

at Makerere University, graduating in 1994 with a Bachelor of Laws degree. In 1995, he attended the Law Development Centre

(LDC), where he obtained a postgraduate diploma in Legal Practice.

Upon his graduation from LDC, he was retained as a lecturer at the Centre for two years.

While at Makerere University, Jacob got actively involved in student politics and went on to serve as the Guild Speaker between 1989 and 1990.

Together with colleagues Norbert Mao and Charles Owor, they started Oulanyah,

Owor and Mao Company Advocates, a private law fi rm in Kampala in 1995.

In 1996, he married the love of his youth, Ms. Dorothy Nang'wale, an ardent child rights activist. She is believed to have been the force behind Jacob's stellar political career. Dorothy passed on in August 2009.

He successfully contested for political o ffice and joined the 7th



Parliament as Member of Parliament (MP) for Omoro County, Gulu District in 2001. He was appointed to chair Parliament's Legal and Parliamentary Aff airs Committee in his inaugural term as MP.

He, however, lost the bid for re-election into the 8th Parliament in 2006 and bounced back in the 9th (2011-2016) and 10th (2016-2021) Parliaments where he served as MP and Deputy Speaker of Parliament of the Republic of Uganda.

acob was instrumental in the peace talks between the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) and the Government of Uganda that led to the silencing of guns in Northern Uganda.

In 2001 with the support of his wife, Dorothy, he initiated the establishment of the Uganda Parliament Forum for Children (UPFC) with nine (g) members. The forum has now become a household name. He served as the patron of the UPFC from inception till the time of his demise.

On 13th July 2019, Oulanyah was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Theology by Zoe Life Theological College USA, earning him the title Rt Hon. Dr. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah.

He served as a board member of The Global

Majority, an international organization committed to the promotion of non-violent conflict management through education, training, networking and advocacy. He was also the Co-Rapporteur on the Committee of Political Aff airs in the African Caribbean and Pacifi c/European Union groups of states (ACP/EU).

Rt Hon. Dr. Jacob L. Oulanyah was reelected to represent Omoro County, Omoro District, in the 11th Parliament as Member of Parliament. On 24th May 2021, he was elected as the Speaker of the 11th Parliament of the Republic of Uganda. His mission was to restore public confi dence in the institution of Parliament and make it people-centred.

n 19th March 2022, Rt Hon. Dr. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah went to be with the Lord.

Jacob is survived by eight (8) children, three (3) grandchildren and several dependants. In addition, he is survived by his father Mzee Nathan Okori, brother Francis Emuna, and sisters Harriet Adong Okori and Betty Ajok Okori and several cousins, nieces and nephews.



Oulanyah did a good job uniting northern Uganda, says President Museveni

His Excellency President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni has lauded the late Rt Hon. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah as a disciplined cadre and a nationalist, who helped in uniting the people of northern Uganda. The President was speaking at the state funeral prayers for the fallen Speaker at the Kololo Ceremonial Grounds in Kampala on Wednesday April 6, 2022.

ere below are excerpts of the President's eulogy of the late Rt Hon. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah:

"When I see what the late Jacob Oulanyah has been able to achieve in form of contributions. I

remember these verses in the Bible. "What man sows, that's what he reaps," (Galatians:7:6-9). Because of this verse, whatever man sows he will reap. By planting the message of unity, all these young leaders you see them coming up like Oulanyah, the Vice President (HE Jessica

Alupo), and the Speaker (Rt Hon. Anita Among), they came up because of the good seed; whatever you plant is what you harvest. If you plant sectarianism, definitely you will harvest different results.

"I did not know Oulanyah. He was born in 1965 when I was in S.5. I was 20 years old. I call him my son (woda). Oulanyah was young but he had already made impact.

In the NRM, I think we first dealt with him when he was on the Legal Committee of Parliament although he was still in the opposition, and that's how we started seeing that he was somebody of potential. He was able to break away from the sectarian politics of the opposition. He broke away and saw where there was good light and came, and made very big contributions.

"Oulanyah was a man of talents. You have heard that he was an orator, a good speaker but you can be an orator for bad things and an orator for good things. You have heard that he was hard-working. So when we identified and supported him to become Deputy Speaker for 10 years he used that time to multiply his talents.

"So, therefore losing Oulanyah now is a big loss because he was somebody definitely who was coming up and the country was going to get a lot of benefits from him. He had already done a good job in uniting Northern Uganda, which had been messed up by bad politics, like the rest of Uganda.

"The NRM tried to unite all Ugandans. We said unite because you have similar needs. You need one another, that was our line. However, recently, when Oulanyah became Vice Chairperson NRM (Northern Uganda) in a very short time he seems to have deepened the unity in the North which we had tried, but had not achieved as much as he did in the short time. Really, I need to salute Oulanyah and commend him as an example to you people.

"I do not want to hear the talk of 'Northern, Northern', again. Stop that. Oulanyah was not the Speaker of the North but the speaker of Uganda. So when you hear the opportunists talking, tell them to shut up. NRM supported him not because of this or that group but because he was a good cadre. He would never have won if NRM had not supported him. They supported him because of his patriotism and his pan-Africanism, not because of clans.

"In the issue of death, health is a weapon. Some people say health is wealth, but also it is a weapon. So if you are fighters for Africa take good care of your health.

In this case, Oulanyah was a very disciplined person but I came to know about the problem for the first time when he went to Dubai with some Ugandan doctors. Apparently he had so these issues to deal with, then he had also to deal with the politics here; Omoro his constituency, Vice Chairman NRM Northern region, Speakership; all these things. But what is clear is that if he had contacted or informed me, I would have advised him to concentrate on health, but I did not know. It was much later that I got to know.

"I want to salute the contribution of Oulanyah, and extend condolences to his family and the people of Omoro; we shall stand with them. And whatever Oulanyah was doing, we shall take up and complete like we did for our comrades who died in the struggle."

Sleep well OJ!

he passing on of the Rt Hon. Speaker of Parliament, Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah, is most regrettable. I extend my deep sympathies to his family, the people of Omoro, the people of Acholi and the Parliament of Uganda for this great loss.

Oulanyah and I were great friends; I used to call him OJ and he would call me Masaka. If I were asked to choose a befitting epitaph for this honourable man, I would probably say, "Here lies a man who never lived his full life" because in my view, OJ's life was just beginning. This, for me, is a major invitation for the children to reflect on the life of their father as a life that was incomplete and to carry on the duty, charge up, fill up the gaps and live his dreams.

I met OJ 11 years ago when I first came to Parliament. As a budding politician, there are colleagues I looked up to for inspiration and OJ was one of them. He had a big heart and he would speak with sincerity - he was very sincere!

I remember during my first term in Parliament, I singlehandedly opposed the listing of Umeme on the Uganda Securities Exchange - probably, some Members did not know what it was - and OJ was presiding over the House. I passionately submitted, OJ was alert and he knew what I was talking about. However, knowing the practice in the House, when Members do not understand what you are saying and the Speaker has a duty



to rule, he rules and the "Ayes" carry the day.

After the session, he called me to his office and told me, "Mathias, you had a point but you see, these issues were not properly incubated and I had a duty to move the country forward." I said, "Right Honourable, I am okay with that, but I am on record as having guided the House otherwise." He understood that there was a void in the way the matter was presented by the honourable minister; he was that sincere! As a presiding officer, he never had the arrogance of saying, "I have it all." When he knew you were right, he would call you and say, "You were right."

I pity the new Members; they have missed seeing OJ preside over and guide the House with a lot of wit. In his acceptance speech, following his election as Speaker, he made a lot of promises, including being a Speaker of a Parliament with a difference. He has not lived to make that promise come true; we can only imagine what that promise was about.

When I was appointed Leader of the Opposition by my party, the National Unity Platform (NUP), he called me and said, "Masaka, I have been looking for you; I saw your name and my apocalypse was saying that probably, you could be the one. I was thinking that it is either you or your brother, Sseggona. But can I tell you, I am excited about the prospect of sparring with you on the Floor." I said, "Right Honourable, I am delighted; we shall work together." That was him!

When I was launching the Opposition Legislative



Agenda, I went to him and said, "OJ, I have a programme for the Opposition that we want to launch." He said, "What!" I have no choice; I am your Speaker." Trust OJ, he was the Chief Guest at the launch of the Opposition Legislative Agenda. He spoke passionately and said, "I have not seen this before. I have been in this House but for the Opposition to have a roadmap, I have not seen it before; I am excited!"

He had a big view of Uganda. He was among the men capable of taking this country forward. There are so many able, well trained and cultured Ugandans that can steer this country and get us out of this abyss of thinking, "if it is not me, then no one else." Ours should be a service and not self-service. To his family, especially the children, be comforted by the fact that your father never died in vain. His life was not a life lived in vain for we are not mourning the passing of an ordinary man but a statesman.

We thank God for the purposeful life he lived; we thank God because we got to know him; and we thank God for his service to the country.

I was lucky to have spoken to him when he was in the USA for treatment. We spoke for about five minutes on the phone and he asked me to pray for him. Unfortunately, that was to be the last time we spoke.

Jacob Oulanyah has gone at his prime; we shall dearly miss him. May God grant him eternal rest.


The intellectual giant has gone: I salute the memory of his exceptional leadership

find it saddening but also a great honour to pay this final tribute to our departed Rt Hon. Speaker of Parliament, Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah. I first met Jacob in 2010 in Omoro where I had gone to look for my campaign manager, the late Tony Oyuru, who resided there. Coincidentally, both of us were looking for our agents. My first impression of him was that he was a highly articulate, confident and inspiring person who had strong faith in God. He observed that I sounded worried about the elections but he urged me to put my faith in God and he asserted, with prophetic certitude, that both of us would make it to the Ninth Parliament, which indeed turned out to be the case.

Jacob's life and path intersected with mine in significant ways. We both came from the greater Okarowok clan, which further cemented our sense of connectedness. Omoro County, his constituency, and Oyam District that I represent in Parliament share a border. Jacob's constituency home and mine are just about five kilometres apart. Since our constituencies bordered one another, the people we served also share needs, concerns, and aspirations. Their lives and experiences are intertwined and they interact closely, often sharing ideas, information and challenges from time to time. Many a time, whenever Jacob heard complaints from my

voters, he would call me immediately and urge me to act swiftly. He cared deeply for the plight of our people. He kept abreast with whatever was happening even in my district.

I remember a time my voters were complaining about the human-wildlife conflict, after some elephants from Murchison Falls National Park had invaded my district. Jacob inquired whether I had contacted the Minister of Tourism, Wildlife and Antiquities. I told him that I had presented the matter before Parliament and contacted the Minister. He advised me to walk to the Ministry because the nature of the problem was grave. Since then, the Government has embarked on fencing the conflict point.

Jacob was a man of action and he believed that every problem had a solution. He believed that pointed action, not futile grumbling, was the antidote to any problem.

Due to the alignment of several other factors that I cannot enumerate, Jacob was the Parliamentary colleague to whom I felt closest. He was a brother, a colleague, a mentor, a counsellor and above all a friend. He was open-hearted, quick to guide and correct, and frank to a fault.

Jacob was a God-fearing person who sought the hand of God in everything. Once, his father, Mzee Nathan Okori, invited me to a goat-roasting



party. Jacob, who was held up in Kampala, called to inquire whether we had started with prayer, reminding us that everything must always start with God. We had to bring in a Reverend hurriedly to add the prayer component to the party. Jacob always quipped that with God everything is possible.

I came to understand him as a man who had an excellent relationship with his father. He listened to and respected his father deeply; the two were admiringly close. Both Jacob and I benefited greatly from the wise political counsel of Mzee Okori.

Jacob believed in unity irrespective of creed, party affiliation or where one came from. He held no grudge and believed in forgiveness and peaceful solutions to conflict. What he valued most from each of us, Members of Parliament, was the effective representation of our people. Jacob's brilliance and great oratory skills were beyond reproach. He was the pride of Parliament whenever he made a presentation at international fora. He made us walk with our heads held high.

Jacob was committed to the work of Parliament. He knew where he wanted the institution to head, and he dedicated himself to the pursuit of that vision. He wanted a Parliament that was research-driven and in which deliberations were evidence-based. He emphasised the quality of parliamentary debates and he encouraged parliamentarians to do research. He would threaten that he would not give the Floor to those who never bothered to research.

He leaves behind a legacy of dedicated service above self, responsive and trustworthy leadership,

patriotism and love for duty. He wanted to turn Parliament into a people-centred institution in the truest sense of the expression. He was beyond any doubt one of the most charismatic and motivational leaders who ever trod the corridors of Parliament. We will remember him for his great oratory and outstanding negotiation skills that transcended political divides.

Jacob was a declared enemy of tribalism and nepotism. He was a Ugandan, an East African, an African and a citizen of the world. He was a dedicated promoter of a peaceful, inclusive and equitable Uganda and the National Development Agenda. He sponsored and supported hundreds of underprivileged students from Acholi subregion and beyond. He saw leadership as a platform for service.

We will miss him as a statesman, a visionary and an advocate for equitable development. He was very passionate and committed to his work and his vision.



Jacob Oulanyah L'Okori: Not A Passing Star!





t the time of his passing, Jacob Oulanyah L'Okori (March 23, 1965 - March 20, 2022) was working on his autobiography, which he had tentatively titled "Not a passing star". He wanted to signal that he was more than just a bright star shooting across the dark night sky to oblivion. His was about making deep impact on everything he did, both in private and public life.

From a humble and difficult beginning in Lalogi Village, where he completed his primary education, Jacob was competitive in school. Later in politics, he fiercely forged a life of service to his community in Omoro and to the country.

He was a gifted orator, able to capture the essence of issues with bold yet smooth observations. He was downto-earth, moved gracefully in

the corridors of power, and was easily approachable and personable. He knew when to stand his ground and when to reach a compromise. He was a uniter of people, bringing diverse interests and priorities for negotiated resolutions. For him, a principled disagreement was the start of a lasting friendship and understanding, not the end of communion.

Whether he was riding on one of his beloved motorcycles or climbing the Guruguru rocks in Amuru District, Jacob was passionate about life. A very private person, he loved the little things in life that brought him much happiness - going for an ice-cream or swim with his children, spending a soiree of music with friends. He embodied the freedom of spirit to explore, to experience adventure and to give back as much as he got from his friendship and to the community he lived in and loved without fear.

He felt a strong responsibility to his children - Diana Oulanyah, Andrew Ojok Oulanyah, Christian Oulanyah, Kimberley Oulanyah and Karlynn Oulanyah. His children with his late wife, Dorothy Nangwale Oulanyah, who lived at home with him - Harold "Didi" Adiyo Oulanyah, Ezra Audu Oulanyah and Karen Atim Oulanyah - meant the world to him. After their mother passed away in August 2009, Jacob worked hard at being a single parent to them, ensuring their proper education and upbringing. Paying tribute to her father during a vigil, Karen said, "He was both my father and my mother, taking care of me."

In his final days when the pain of illness knocked ever so urgently on his body, Jacob remained courageous, strong, and very positive. Of course, he was deeply concerned about the future of his children. But he was also comforted by the knowledge that he had laid the foundation for their participation in the life of the country that he loved so dearly.

In his essence, Jacob understood the meaning of, "For God and my country". He demonstrated that it meant being steeped in one's culture while respecting and promoting other cultures.

We must preserve Jacob Oulanyah's Legacy!

first met the Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah at his private office in Naguru in March 2021 after my election as Member of Parliament for Kabula County, Lyantonde District. During that short interaction, I re-affirmed my commitment to support him as Speaker of the 11th Parliament. Before this meeting, I had followed his politics of unity and his loyalty to the NRM, and President Museveni in particular, through the media and Parliament.

Subsequently, I invited him to preside over a function in my constituency, which he honoured. He had a lunch stopover at our mutual friend's home and also my maternal uncle, Gen. Pecos Kutesa (RIP), even before our swearing-in. Later, I got the privilege of my lifetime to chair his campaign taskforce for the post of Speaker. This helped to strengthen our friendship.

Like the rest of the country, I have been trying to make sense of his sudden passing. I know many friends will give different reasons but I wish to point out what I think might be of significance in God allowing him to win the speakership even when He (God) knew he would not live for long. The answer lies in one of our favourite campaign songs that Jacob greatly loved, titled "Yoo Leng!" My Luo colleagues say this song is about God clearing the way, removing obstacles so that one can reach their destination smoothly.

I strongly believe that Jacob was used by God

to clear the way for the 11th Parliament. He removed the obstacles that characterised the previous leadership of Parliament, where we saw bad working relations between the Speaker and the Deputy Speaker, clearing the way for the 11th Parliament to move away from being a Member's Parliament to a people's Parliament. Jacob built bridges for NRM in the northern region, which had for decades been crushed by mistrust. He preached unity and walked the path by sharing the NRM ideology across the divide. Due to his efforts, in the last presidential elections we saw a big change in the fortunes of NRM, for President Museveni and NRM parliamentary colleagues from the region.

Jacob Oulanyah may be dead but we all know what his mission in life was. He preached and lived for peace and a corrupt-free Uganda. He was a nationalist who trusted a young man like me, from the other side of the country, to lead his campaign. He looked at his leadership beyond the prism of Acholi.

As we condole with the family, I wish to urge Parliament and the Government of Uganda to gazette a day for his memorial lecture annually, so that it acts as a reminder for all of us and the future generations to carry forward the legacy of this great son of Uganda.

It was also about that time that he started sharing with me about his ailments and recurring spiritual attacks that required extra spiritual effort to avert. Many times, I would call him on the spot when he was either very low or ill, needing urgent prayers.

Jacob assured me that he would uphold God's principles during his tenure as Speaker of Parliament and that he was set to transform the Parliament of Uganda with godly ambitions.

As time went by, as his pastor, I noticed that he was hardly getting better, yet he had to carry on all his regular duties. We shared all these concerns and scriptures, however placing everything in the hands of God

he Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah had known of my calling way back in 2006 because I led voluntary intercession for the Parliament of Uganda, especially for the peace talks then in Juba, which had stalled.

Very many people in Uganda and abroad prayed for the quick recovery of the Speaker including the Archbishop of the Church of Uganda, the Most Rev. Stephen Samuel Kaziimba Mugalu; Mama Janet Museveni; Members and staff of Parliament; all Bishops and the entire church.

On 1 Jan 2022, Felix Odobo, one of his ADCs, called Shirlene Mukite, his Personal Assistant, crying, "Please, call the Chaplain, the Speaker is not doing well at all." Hardly 40 minutes went by before I mobilised familiar faces to him to go to his residence in Muyenga. He was critically ill. We prayed intensely for a while; after which, lots of coordination took place to get him relief through treatment.

Before he left for Seattle, USA, I gave him Holy Communion and while on treatment in the USA, I was able to pray with him through the last one and half weeks before his passing. I prayed with Jacob daily, up to the very last two hours to his death.

My dear friend, Jacob, the Parliament of Uganda Anglican Chaplaincy will miss you dearly while God and the heavenly hosts will receive you joyfully.

For now, let me get back to your order of service as you ascend to heavenly glory.

It is going to be very difficult to operate without our beloved member, the Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah. I remember him walking into my office during his orientation tour as Speaker of the 11th Parliament and he told me, "Ruth, I want us to turn this House into a place of prayer". I knew it was a divine assignment for us as a chaplaincy. Little did I know we would carry out this tall order without him!

I do not remember the chaplaincy holding any carol services without him in attendance, be it for Easter or Christmas; he was always there, clad in his bow tie, ready to lead us through his favourite song, "Wipolo bot Lubanga", which is in his local dialect. How nostalgic!

Jackie Lamunu, who worked with him closely in the last eight months of his life, recalls that his hearty laughter would always assure them that all was well.





Is it possible to turn the clock backwards? Only Joshua in the Bible was able to make the sun and moon stay still. If I had the authority, I would do the same until our tears run dry.

In our fellowship, Oulanyah was known as an amiable person whose heart was stirred towards furthering the kingdom of God. This is reflected in a story told by Sophie Piloya, a member of the fellowship. She arrived in Kampala from Gulu for the advancement of her studies in 2011. She saw a grey future because of the overwhelming bills. While visiting an MP in Parliament to ask for support. she was assured that being a person from a different constituency, it would be hard for the MP to fund her studies. She was referred to the office of Rt Hon. Oulanvah, who was the Deputy Speaker at the time. He offered to support her through her education and he was faithful to his promise. As of today, Sophie is a graduate of Makerere University, working in the Parliament of Uganda, thanks to the support of the late Rt Hon. Speaker. Sophie remains a testimony of Oulanyah's faithfulness as a vessel to do God's work.

Olok Geoffrey, a member of the chaplaincy's music department, recalls who Oulanyah was: "Despite his busy schedule, the man was spiritual. He seemed to be well grounded in God and fully committed to Him. He knew the Bible."

The Rt Hon. Oulanyah did not hold back his treasures for the advancement of the kingdom of God through the chaplaincy. There is no specific budget line in the Parliamentary Commission to support the chaplaincy's

activities; it operates on the goodwill and support of members.

In Matthew 6:21, the Bible states, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also". The Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah will be remembered as one of the brethren who gave financial and moral support towards the activities of the chaplaincy especially for critical events like the carol services. He always joined in the chaplaincy events and sung in the choir severally, sometimes adorning the choir uniform.

Ms Josephine Watera recalls that at the reception of the MPs of the 11th Parliament, which was hosted by the Archbishop of the Church of Uganda in December 2021, Rt Hon. Oulanyah constituted a task force to, among other things, mobilise resources to support the activities of the chaplaincy. There are high expectations in this task force. We all hope that the task force will work even harder to fulfil his desires despite his departure.

Ms Watera further reminisces that the Rt Hon. Oulanyah emphasised the call in Matthew 6:33 of seeking the kingdom of God and his righteousness first. He knew that whatever we have is for the Lord and we are only privileged stewards by God's grace.

We are convinced that because of how he used his treasures, his soul is resting peacefully in the heavenly places.

"Good morning, Shirlene. How are you?"

hat is how easy it was to work for the Rt Hon. Speaker, Jacob Oulanyah. His dealings with the staff of his office went beyond the boss-employee style; it was friendship, family, history and relationship, all the way from his security team or "the crew" as we commonly

called them, to the administration staff of his office.

I was privileged to work for the Rt Hon. Speaker as his Personal Assistant. It is a job, I dare say, I did not feel deserving of because I had always been made to believe that this position is reserved for people who share the same tribe as their principal. That, in itself, spoke to the kind of man he was; colour, race, size or shape did not matter to him. What mattered was delivery





on the job and having a value system which ably represented him.

Initially, I was nervous, as anyone else would be, working for a person of such a calibre for the first time; but Christine Awor, who had served in the same position for a long time, kept reassuring me and guiding me on how to handle certain challenges. She also emphasised how humorous he was yet serious too. You would have to be smart to know when to actually burst out laughing with him or when to silently be amused.

I saw his funny side many times and that made work even much more satisfying. Like the adage goes, "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy". My boss was never dull. It, therefore, saddens me to think how painful and sad it must have been for him while he was confined on treatment.

The Rt Hon. Speaker was honest to the bone. He never dealt in gossip as a currency and he made it clear to all his staff that his currency, as I got to learn, was facts and not hearsay.

He was a man reverent and submitted to God. Just as he served his nation with zeal and diligence, so did he serve his God. This is an attribute that governed his lifestyle, from friendships to work and family.

I had never met a high profile person such as him who saw pride and pomp as vanity. He was humble and down-to-earth; all one needed to do was walk up to him and you would have his attention. He did everything with excellence. From all these testimonies that have been given, he knew he had a legacy to leave, a stamp in the books of global history to make, and what a stamp he has made!

My heart bleeds every time I think about that morning call from his ADC(s) asking, "Shirlene, where are you?" He would arrive on the office floor and the aura would change - expect a stopover at his waiting room to see who had arrived, a light conversation and probably a joke with one or two persons, then a "good morning" or "hello" to his admins before he went into his office.

The entire office prayed for a miracle. We hoped for the best but God knew best.

I will miss serving him because every day as I worked for him, I knew I was working for the right kind of man - one who not only opens doors for you but also holds your hand willingly as you walk in.

He was an honest man, a great boss, friend and father to many, high and low. He was a respecter of humanity and a leader like no other.

Jacob L' Okori Oulanyah: The champion of ubuntu and torch bearer for emerging leaders

y first meeting with the Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah was in August, 2019 when I walked into his office a few minutes past 1.00p.m. together with the Director of Communication and Public Affairs in Parliament, Mr Chris Obore. On that day, Oulanyah was going to chair the House and as soon as we entered his office, he requested us to keep it short and to the point. I expressed my interest in having him as our guest speaker at a youth leadership fellowship dubbed "Mazungmuzo". He never hesitated and immediately said, "Work out the details with my team. I will come."

True to his word, he came to speak to the informal group of youth. I vividly remember him

dressed down in a pair of jeans, matching Teeshirt and a cap. For a man we held in high regard and had waited for anxiously, his dress code immediately made all of us feel at home around him. He spoke passionately about his humble background and the struggles in the war-torn northern Uganda. He also walked us through his deep convictions on the role of the youth in shaping the fortunes of Uganda. He invited us not to be spectators in the affairs of our nation but rather participants.

His speech left a lasting impression on me.

Two months after the youth fellowship, I gave him a courtesy call and he invited me to his home in Muyenga on a Sunday. Our conversation that day would end up being the







beginning of our close working relationship for the last two years. He placed me in charge of his political and mobilisation affairs. We shared an office every day and travelled to the field together. Our mission was to achieve the trinity - one, becoming Vice-Chairperson of the NRM in northern Uganda; two, re-election as MP for Omoro County; and three, ultimately, becoming Speaker of Parliament. All of which we achieved successfully.

Jacob Oulanyah inspired me to change from an idealist to a practicing political strategist. He was a man of great wit, eloquence, a master of the law, a nationalist and a humanist. He was an "eater of life" with a big spoon - he was a cheerleader, singer, dancer and a consummate mobiliser.

His virtue on time keeping was not as much about time as it was about his expression of respect for other people. He was loyal to his friends and leaders like President Museveni both in their presence and absence.

Working closely with him gave mean opportunity to study his philosophy on decision-making, which again was expressed in trinity - Is it okay with my God? Is it legal? How will it improve the life of an ordinary person? Whenever a project, function or assignment passed this test of his decision-making ethos, you would be sure he was on board.

One poignant lesson he taught us in politics was the change of paradigm in political mobilisation. He despised NRM cadres who would introduce themselves as "NRM mobilisers". His view, which he was not shy to share, was that individuals

do not mobilise but interests do. During every campaign, he insisted on having a message that rallied people around common interests. With his gift of the gab, he used less money in politics than all his opponents as he motivated and won over people to support him. His was the idea around which people wanted to achieve their interests.

High on the list of his unfinished political dreams was the debate on "the Uganda we want". He had asked us to come up with a structure for this debate and suggested that it would happen immediately after he had finished a semi-formal capacity building session with all first-time Members of Parliament on the Parliamentary Rules of Procedure. He had set this as the first official business of 2022.

After a successful tour of the northern region to deliver his "thank you" to the region for supporting the party chairman, himself and other leaders, he had instructed party whips to form sub-regional committees to help in the execution of his works. He hoped to turn Omoro into a model constituency.

To keep his legacy alive, I propose and commit to work with official and non-official actors to establish the Jacob Oulanyah Annual Memorial Lecture that would act as an inspiration to the new generation of leaders for a united and prosperous Uganda that he envisioned.

Rest in peace my most consequential mentor.

Tribute to Rt Hon. Jacob L'Okori Oulanyah, Speaker 11th Parliament of The Republic of Uganda

n 1980, 15-year-old Jacob Oulanyah was my Senior One (S.1) mathematics student at St Joseph's College, Layibi, Gulu. I was a 24-year-old Grade V teacher of mathematics and physics who had just graduated the year before (1979) from National Teachers' College, Kyambogo.

Layibi College in 1980 had a happy, optimistic and well-resourced school and academic environment. It is, therefore, not surprising that most of my S1 class excelled and three of them went on to become global stars: Jacob L. Oulanyah (RIP); Dr Jimmy Lamo of the National Agricultural Research Organisation (NARO); and Dr Walter Ochan, a successful medical doctor practicing in South Africa.

Later, I was transferred to Gulu High School (1981-1983) and it was not until the mid-1990s that I would again run into Jacob Oulanyah in Kampala City. I had left Uganda in 1989 for further studies in the USA and returned in October 1996. I had gone to consult my friend, Lawyer Charles Owor (RIP), at his law firm in Uganda House

wing on Nkrumah Road, only to find that it was the law firm of three idealistic young Acholi lawyers: Charles Owor, Jacob Oulanyah and Nobert Mao. All were passionate for justice, especially for northern Uganda.

You may recall that Charles Owor was a Commissioner in the Stephen Akabway-chaired Electoral Commission that supervised the 1996 Presidential Elections; Norbert Mao has risen to become the President-General of the Democratic Party; and Jacob Oulanyah rose to become Speaker of the 11th Parliament of Uganda. What a trajectory for the three idealistic young Acholi lawyers I encountered in the mid-1990s!

My next encounter with Jacob Oulanyah came in 2002/2003 when he was a first-term MP for Omoro County. By then, I was a Lecturer in Peace Studies and Founder Director, Centre for Conflict Management and Peace Studies, Gulu University. A group of Acholi MPs, including Hon. Oulanyah, Hon. Hilary Onek and Hon. Zachary Olum, were addressing a Town Hall meeting at St Monica's Vocational Centre, Gulu. I attended and sat at the back of the hall. Hon. Oulanyah noticed me and he pointed at me and said



loudly and clearly for the hall audience to hear, "You see that man sitting over there; that was my teacher in Layibi College. I loved the way he spoke English and since then, I have wanted to speak like him."

From then on, I became Lapwony (Teacher) whenever we met or spoke on the phone, and he became Latin kwan, meaning "student", although the literal translation of Latin kwan is "Child-reader" with teacher-student power hierarchy connotations. In 2018, however, Deputy Speaker Oulanyah flipped this teacher-student power hierarchy on me, with his characteristic mischievous humour.

Jacob Oulanyah was as passionate for justice for the down-trodden and voiceless as he was intellectually reflexive. One particular religious encounter, which genuinely baffled him during the Juba Peace Talks, was the fervency and seriousness with which Joseph Kony LRA rebels prayed to "God". He later remarked, "Lapwony, those guys prayed so fervently and seriously that I felt ashamed of my own shallow prayers."

I encouraged him not to feel ashamed of his prayers because most Acholi Christian leaders - Anglican, Catholic and Pentecostal - did not have the courage to confront Joseph Kony and rebuke him about his LRA "holy spirit" that sanctioned violence and death against the same Acholi people he purported to liberate. I told him that Alice Lakwena and Joseph Kony's LRA "holy spirit" was probably a reification of



"jok lubanga", the much feared pre-Christian deity that sanctioned violence and death against the very Acholi it purported to liberate.

When Oulanyah became Deputy Speaker in 2011, he introduced me to his office secretary in Parliament as his former teacher in Layibi College. Henceforth, the secretary would always welcome me with a warm smile when I went to see him in his office. She would say, "Lapwony madit; wapwoyo bino" (Big teacher, welcome).

In 2018, Hon. Jacob Oulanyah seized the opportunity to flip our Lapwony (teacher)-Latin kwan (child-reader) power hierarchy. This was during Mama Alice Ogwal's funeral service at All Saints Cathedral, Kampala, on 31 July 2018. He was the Chief Mourner and I was the emcee.



I had recognised Dr Ruth Senyonyi, daughter of the late Bishop Misaeri Kauma, but forgot to introduce her as the incumbent President of Mothers' Union. When she stood to eulogise Mama Alice Ogwal, Dr Ruth Senyonyi joked: "This young man, George Piwang-Jalobo, does not know I am the incumbent President of Mothers' Union." Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah picked on this as his opener. With his characteristic mischievous humour he said, "I am happy for the first time someone has called Mr George Piwang-Jalobo a child (latin)."

One my most memorable times with him was shared in 2019 when my big brother, retired Archbishop Henry Luke Orombi, received his honorary doctorate at the Kampala Serena Hotel. The Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah was the guest of honour. I had gone fully clad, with my decorated "bila" (horn) round my neck. I blew it when my brother was hooded and robed with his honorary doctorate regalia.

When I went to greet him, Rt Hon. Oulanyah said, "Lapwony, if you see my bila, you will run!" I then taunted him and said, "But where is it? It should be around your neck!" He replied, "I have left it in the car." To which I said, "Next time, wear it." He replied, "I will". Therefore, I was mighty proud of him when he wore his bila around his neck and blew it throughout the presidential campaigns in 2020 and 2021. When they played "Yoo Leng, Piliii", it was beautiful to watch him dance with his bila round his neck and blow it too.

That explains how and why in 2021, northern Uganda voted overwhelmingly for the NRM - all because of Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah, NRM Vice-Chairman for northern Uganda. For the first time since 1986, it could be said that the Northern Resistance Movement (NRM) has possibly begun to transform into the National Reconciliation Movement (NRM).

But alas, Rt Hon. Jacob Oulanyah, Twon coo, oteka olweny (you are silent now) though your bila pwod kok over the hills from yonder! You showed Uganda that excellence is still possible in our governance and political discourse even though mediocrity fights tooth and nail to become the norm. You were a straightline, hence a BIG threat next to every crooked line. You were the genuine, original article, hence a NIGHMARE next to every counterfeit!

Jacob Oulanyah, you shot from the skies of Omoro, Acholiland, northern Uganda, and lit up the skies over Uganda and then you quickly vanished like a meteorite into many twinkling stars. You have now kissed the face of God. And now you smile and dance with the Angels.

Smile on. Dance on. Twon Coo, Oteka lweny, Oluma!
